Directors' Note

A little background to begin. This production of "The Brothers Grimm Spectaculathon" begins at a kitchen table somewhere in Basel, as a group of Beggars sits together to talk about fairy tale themed plays. Someone at the table introduces us to "The Brothers Grimm Spectaculathon" but it takes a couple of months until we realise that this play is a great match for us and just about as mad as what we're about to attempt.

Being newbies ourselves, we agree that a workshop would be a great way to find our directing feet and offer other newcomers an easy gateway drug into Beggardom. We plan six sessions that cover, among other things, improv acting, character work and voice and movement sessions that include a trip to Augusta Raurica. With a little help from our friends, five successful sessions pass. After cutting the roles of the play down to just under 40, we choose the members of our cast and everyone gets to read their lines for the first time during the sixth and final session.

With scripts and cast ready, three intense months of rehearsals pass. The result is what you see on stage now, an amalgam of experimental experience, friendly friends, laugh-out-loud laughter and weeks of work.

Back when we sat in that kitchen, we played with the idea of a project with friends. What we ended up doing was a project with friends and even more friends. We are grateful to our cast, friends and all the people we can rely on in and out of Beggardom, on and off stage. This is for you. May we all laugh happily ever after.

Jessica Meier: Selina and I started our project in May 2018. During a seven month process of workshops, castings, rehearsals and

organisational matters I never got tired of working with our cast. I was most interested in learning about interpersonal dynamics: how they work on stage and




backstage and how to channel the different energies in our cast into a play that weaves them all together. My experiences of these past few months taught me a lot more than I could have ever wished for and I am forever grateful. **Selina Wolfisberg:** My initial doubts about "The Brothers Grimm Spectaculathon" dissipated once the workshops started and peo-



ple breathed life into the characters. To see theatre younglings, and those with more experience, grow into Jedi of the stage, to see them navigate it with ease and

About the Play



"Once upon a time..." - The beginning of every Grimm fairy tale is an invitation into a world that is not our own. The collected stories of the Brothers Grimm take their audience into a land of fantasy and dreams, the wonderful and the cruel, the evil, the mysterious and the beautiful. Their setting in time and space remains unknown.

Where animals talk and behave like humans, where dwarves, ghosts and witches are as much at home as princ*esses and evil stepmothers, the audience is confronted with several fundamentally human experiences. The protagonists of these stories become gatekeepers to the human soul as they go through some of our deepest emotions, be it love, hate, fear, loneliness, greed or pride.

This room of the fantastic can be a refuge and a counterworld to our reality. In a narra-

tive of good versus evil, fairy tales are often used to create a fiction of a world in order. Their message: everything can be different from how it is.

The Brothers Grimm Spectaculathon lends itself well to breaking with such clichées. The fairy tale parody, written by US author Don Zolidis in 2007, is full of characters who question traditional gender roles, xenophobia or capitalism and problematize popular relationship concepts such as feelings of entitlement or the idea(I) of love at first sight.

The Brothers Grimm's "Kinder- und Hausmärchen" is one of the most frequently translated works of literature of the German language. They are part of our past and contemporary cultural history and a classic of world literature. It's time to have a look at them from a new angle.


